ITEM 1:	Approve Action Notes From July 13, 2007 AFAC Meeting
ITEM 2:	Election of New AFAC Vice-Chair
	Doug Taki's last day in his current term as Chair will be September 30; Brad Houslet will move from Vice-Chair to Chair effective October 1. The AFAC needs to elect a new Vice-Chair.
ITEM 3:	Lamprey TWG Update
	The Lamprey TWG met on the morning of August 7, and held a workshop in the afternoon. The Members have tasked the TWG to work with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and other interested parties to develop lamprey passage objectives and related performance standards and measures. Dave Ward will provide an update of the meeting, workshop, and near-term plans of the TWG.
ITEM 4:	Progress on AFAC Database
	AFAC members have had the opportunity to populate the database since March 19, 2007. CRITFC and the HSRG are anxious to take the AFAC input on population names, and reconcile it with their databases. This does not mean that any one list will be the final word, but the AFAC should wrap up its input soon to facilitate this reconciliation.
ITEM 5:	Draft Amendment Template
	Direction from the MAG to the technical committees at the end of the

July 24-25 amendment strategy workshop included:

Continue collecting data and revising Amendment

recommendations and prepare for MAG and Members review.

- Add more details the draft fish template.
- Prepare draft Amendment outline for review at the September Members Meeting.

The AFAC will review and discuss progress made on the template for developing Program Measures. Examples are now available for most populations of Mid-Columbia steelhead, Upper Columbia spring Chinook, and Upper Columbia steelhead. The AFAC should discuss the level of detail provided in the template. The AFAC also needs to formulate a plan to complete templates for every population, and to develop higher-level (ESU/Province) objectives.

Dave Ward and Tom Iverson will discuss the proposed outline for the draft amendment to be submitted to the Council, and how the series of templates should fit in.

The AFAC must make substantial progress on templates for each population, and agree on how to represent higher-level objectives prior to the September 17 Amendment Strategy Workshop.

- **ITEM 6:** Direction from the MAG to the technical committees at the end of the July 24-25 amendment strategy workshop also included
 - Begin process to define BPA's obligations.

Discussion at the workshop centered on defining the BPA obligation relative to the magnitude of BPA and non-BPA threats/limiting factors. One method to conduct this analysis is to use the AHA tool to compare responses when addressing various threats.

Someone from Jones and Stokes (or failing that, Tom Iverson) will lead us through an example of this analysis.
