Subbasin Objectives and Basin-wide Goals, and the Draft Briefing

**Discussion:** The AFAC focused the discussion primarily on the briefing paper for

Members:

Lynn Hatcher suggested adding a sentence noting that several methods were used to develop objectives and that objectives may be refined as

techniques are updated.

Phil Roger suggested the point be made that some of the fish harvested would have experienced natural mortality, and therefore the final results

might be further refined.

Most of the subsequent discussion focused on potential interpretation of the results by various groups and how to minimize misperceptions and be prepared for questions regarding implications. The discussion should better explain that neither subbasin objectives nor basin-wide goals tell the entire story. Both are important. The paper should clarify that the intent is not to re-calculate loss estimates or recommend changes to objectives and

goals of any geographic scope.

The discussion should include a few examples of what may change, including new hatcheries, and higher harvest levels given the large run

sizes expected if all objectives are being met.

The AFAC agreed that general revisions were sufficient for the briefing paper, but that the presentation at the Members meeting should be framed so that the importance of these topics is clear, and that the Members are encouraged to discuss them in detail prior to distributing the analysis

## outside of CBFWA.
