Appendix B2: Information on Wildlife Areas (WA) in the Columbia Upper Middle. (WDFW website)

WHMA	Location and Habitat
Chelan Butte	Covers ~8,200 acres and occurs just outside the town of Chelan on the south-facing slopes of Chelan Butte on the west side of the Columbia River. The Butte rises 3,825 feet. The unit is primarily dry grassland with some shrubs and a few riparian zones holding most of the wildlife in the area. The unit has experienced recent fires which include the 1994 Tyee fire and the 1988 Dinkleman fire.
Colockum	Covers ~ 88,000 acres located in portions of Chelan and Kittitas Counties. The area lies twenty miles south of Wenatchee and ~ twenty-five miles north-northwest of Ellensburg on the west bank of the Columbia River. The topography climate and vegetative zones vary from the West Bars desert bunchgrass prairie zone found at 580 feet in elevation, through the shrub-steppe, yellow pine, forest, montane forest, and finally to the sub-alpine zone of Mission Peak at 6,875 feet in elevation.
Entiat and Swakane	These areas cover a combined 19,200 acres and are located north of on the west side of the Columbia River. The areas encompass valley bottoms not far from the river that are served by numerous steep drainages with both perennial and intermittent streams. Major habitat includes sage-steppe, ponderosa pine, and several riparian draws. The higher elevations and north slopes of the units some heavy thickets of douglas fir. The 1988 Dinkleman Fire burned a large portion of the area changing much of the habitat to grass. Both areas are important wintering range for mule deer, and offer year-round habitat for upland birds.
Quilomene	This area contains 17,803 acres. The unit consists of steep, rocky slopes and narrow riparian bottoms. Vegetation is comprised of a mix of sagebrush and bitterbrush mixed with a variety of bunchgrasses. The habitat is important for the Colockum elk herd, Quilomene bighorn sheep herd and supports mule deer, birds of prey, song birds, and mammals.
Quincy Lakes	The Quincy Lakes WHMA is 15,266 acres. The geology is the product of erosion of lava flows by glacial flood waters. There are large basalt cliffs, isolated mesas, stair-stepped benches, box canyons, and potholes. Several of the potholes have filled with water providing a diversity of habitat in the area. Big sage/bluebunch wheatgrass is the most common plant community. The area has been identified as one of the most important waterfowl breeding areas in Washington.
Wells Wildlife Area	The Wells Wildlife Area is located on the northwest edge of the Columbia Plateau. The area is underlain by basaltic lava flows and

contains rock knolls with numerous kettle ponds and lakes. Grass

and shrub steppe habitat is dissected by riparian and occasional wetland habitats. The area is comprised of seven management units described below. The unit is 502 acres. It is located adjacent to the Wells reservoir Bridgeport Bar approximately three road miles east of the town of Brewster. The unit topography is flat to gently rolling. Waterfowl frequently use the Wells reservoir, and the ponds and fields that comprise the unit. Bald eagles winter in the area from November to April. Osprey nest in the unit during the spring and summer. The unit is 1,538 acres. Located in Central Ferry Canyon, the unit Central Ferry Canyon is four road miles southwest of the town of Brewster. topography is gently rolling to steeply benched, ranging from 1,350 to 2,800 feet in elevation. Minor seeps and springs feed the central drainage. Fingers of riparian vegetation dissect the shrub steppedominated canyon. Upland game birds and non-game bird species are found in the unit. Indian Dan Canyon The unit consists of 5,036 acres in the Indian Dan Canyon located three road miles west of the town of Brewster. Topography of the unit consists of deep canyons, steep hillsides and glacial terraces that reach from 1,140 feet to 3,050 feet in elevation. The unit is dominated by sagebrush and bitterbrush habitat. Riparian cover lines the canyon bottoms. A ten-acre lake lies in the center of the unit. This is a small 60 acre unit on the River. The unit is gently rolling Unit with varying elevation from 780 to 830 feet. The habitat varies from marshy near the river to dry and sparsely vegetated in the upland areas. The unit is 261 acres and lies 6 road miles east of Brewster on the Washburn Island Colville Confederated Tribe's reservation. The unit is bordered on the north and east by a pond and on the west by the Columbia River. The topography is flat, varying from only 780 feet to 790 feet in elevation. The periphery is laced with marsh vegetation and sloughs and is used by waterfowl. The unit includes 2,930 acres of land and lies five road miles West Foster Creek southeast of the town of Bridgeport. The north-facing unit is gently rolling to steeply-benched, and varies from 1,280 to 2,360 feet in elevation. Sagebrush steppe is the dominant vegetation, though the northern portion is more diverse with extensive meadows and riparian areas. Eight artificial ponds are fed by a developed spring and a creek diversion The 8,616 acres Sagebrush Flat Wildlife Area (SFWA) is located in

Sagebrush Flat

Douglas County, Washington and is comprised of four separate parcels (Units) owned and/or managed by the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife. The SFWA includes the 3,740 acres Sagebrush Flat Unit, the 320 acre Dormaier Unit, and the 2,206 acres Chester Butte Unit.

The Sagebrush Flat Unit was acquired by WDFW in1997 from the Washington Department of Natural Resources (DNR) through a Washington Wildlife and Recreation Program (WWRP) grant administered by the Interagency Committee (IAC) for outdoor recreation. The entire Dormaier (purchased in 1995) and Chester Butte (purchased in 1998) Units were purchased by BPA.

The SFWA was established to promote recovery of sage grouse, sharp-tailed grouse, and pygmy rabbits. In addition, mule deer and a host of shrub-steppe obligate species benefit significantly from habitat protection, maintenance, and enhancement measures already implemented and/or planned for the wildlife area. Shrub-steppe (including shrub- and grass-dominated types) is the dominant habitat on the Sagebrush Flat Wildlife Area (WDFW 1998, WDFW 2001).

Whiskey Dick

The Whiskey Dick Wildlife Area is located on the southeastern foothills of the Colockum range to the west of the Columbia River. The unit contains 28,549 acres. The topography is comprised of steep rocky slopes and narrow riparian bottoms. Vegetation is made up of sagebrush and/or bitterbrush mixed with various bunchgrasses. The unit is important to the maintenance of the Colockum elk herd and provides habitat for mule deer, birds of prey, song birds and other mammals.
